Club Visit to Fieldair Engineering Ltd

Fieldair Engineering is a long established Palmerston North based business starting out aerial topdressing with Tiger Moth biplanes and progressing up to Douglas DC 3 aircraft to perform the task. The PNMEC had visited Fieldair a few years back when Fieldair maintained the fleet of Convair 580 aircraft for its sister company Air Freight NZ. Upon gathering inside the foyer of their building at the Milson Airport one is greeted by the past in the form of a Pratt and Whitney R-1830 Twin Wasp radial engine from a DC 3 aircraft. The overhaul of these engines over the years helped to cement the companies reputation in the field of aircraft engineering. A possible glimpse into the future was positioned next to the Wasp, A large 6 rotor Drone, or to use the correct term, an Unmanned Aerial System. With a payload of 10Kg either liquid spray or powder/granule designed to operate as a fleet of up to 6 units at a time simultaneously. Fieldair are the NZ agents.

Our host Carl Wafer, head of the companies avionics division, then proceeded to escort us through the various workshops and hangers starting with the engine/mechanical overhaul

through the various workshops and hangers starting with the engine/mechanical overhaul shop. Yes they can still perform an overhaul of that Pratt and Whitney Wasp engine that I know some of you possibly have down the back of your shed! We then proceeded on to the Helicopter hanger where two large Eurocopter Puma's are being overhauled to gain certification to fly in NZ. Imported from South America these aircraft are to be used for heavy lifting operations.

One aspect of our visit was that Fieldair operations cover a very board spectrum within the aviation industry. Not only aircraft repair and maintenance but also ground support equipment, cargo bins manufacture, cargo loading equipment maintenance, contract maintenance of aircraft fleets for flying schools and air ambulance operators to name a few. We then moved on to the main hanger where operational aircraft receive routine maintenance and inspection. Here we had the opportunity to inspect an North American Trojan T-28, a large radial powered military trainer from the 1950's owned by an NZ warbirds enthusiast. Then it was on to the temperature controlled avionics shop where ex RNZAF instrument fitter Chris Morton felt right at home with some of his ex service colleagues being currently employed by Fieldair in this shop.
